Berrick Salome

Our small 11th century Oxfordshire church is a gem situated amidst fields, 2 miles from the River Thames at Benson. Our tower contains a ring of six bells, with a 7cwt tenor. The treble is only 2 cwt and was originally cast in 1836. However, the second and fourth were cast in 1621, with the inscription H K. The third, fifth and tenor were cast in 1692 by Alexander Rigbee.



The construction of our bell tower has always been unclear, until 2013 when the timbers were dated very precisely by the University of Oxford when they came, armed with diamond drills, to take minute core samples from our timbers. Three of the trees used for the cross braces were felled in the spring of 1428 and one in the spring of 1429. At that period in history, there is some evidence that unseasoned oak was used for construction. The tower frame is confirmed to be as old as it looks and is a medieval survival of a type unique

in Oxfordshire. It was built at the same time that Joan of Arc was leading the French army to defeat the English at the Battle of Orleans.

During 2013/14 we raised money to have the bells refurbished. They had not been refurbished since 1908. They were reinstalled in June 2015.

The AGM was held at The Abbey Church, Dorchester on Thames; all officers remained in place, and four new members were elected to the branch. Richard Farrant from Dorchester, Jamie Firth and Robert Johnson from Benson, and Viv Muller from Little Milton were presented with their certificates by our very own Hilarie Rogers, Master of ODG. Annie Morrow from Dorchester was elected at the October Branch Practice. Thank you Dorchester for providing an excellent tea for the AGM!

The Branch Striking Competition was held in Shabbington, its anti-clockwise ring causing problems for at least one of the towers. Drayton St Leonard were the outright winners of the competition, with Little Milton being beaten into third position by the Ringing Master's Invitation Band, a band comprised of mainly newer ringers. More exceptional refreshments were consumed - thank you Shabbington! Visits to other towers were encouraged through Tower Twinning. This year, six Towers took part, with exchanges taking place between Dorchester, Drayton St Leonard, Marsh Baldon, Aston Rowant, Chalgrove and Benson.

Whilst the Striking Competition was taking place, several members from the Benson Tower were dancing the night away in celebration of the wedding of their ringer Benji Bateman to Hayley, the bells having been rung before and after the service. Andrew Gillard and Lucy Perry were married at Towersey in October – wonderful that both bride and groom could ring at their own wedding! Congratulations to both couples.

A number of “significant” birthdays and anniversaries have been celebrated by the ringing of Quarter Peals in towers throughout the district. Of particular note was that Margaret Coombe (Chalgrove) rang a quarter peal after her recovery from ill health.

Monthly Branch Practices and Surprise Major/Minor practices have taken place, alongside the well-attended monthly Grandsire and Bob Doubles practices. Do remember that Hilarie Rogers is always pleased to hear from you with training requests. Thank you also to the several towers who hosted visitors from the Bradfield course.

Kay Bartholomew had organised yet another excellent Branch Outing, this year fuelled by diesel instead of steam, with eighteen members transported in carriages pulled by a diesel locomotive on the Swanage Railway. Towers were visited along the line from Swanage to Corfe Castle. It seems that no-one got lost, and the day was rounded off with participants enjoying a tasty meal together at the Swan in East Ilsley. Thank you Kay for all of your hard work in putting these day trips together.

Branch Representative's Report

Guild General Committee Meeting, Sat.11th March 2017, held at Harwell, Oxon.

I apologise for the late delivery of this report. This has in part been due to the volume of material involved, which ran to some 50 pages of A4 and took me some time (and energy!) to summarise. However no criticism of the Guild Officers is intended, as the amount of material reflects the tremendous amount of work being done, for which we owe our continued thanks.

AGM of the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund (Registered Charity No. 268390)

As is customary the AGM of the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund preceded the meeting.

Fund Raising

New money raised in 2016 was £10,600. In real terms this was an increase of £2,447, the total for 2015 of £19,153 having been augmented by a legacy of £11,000. However it should also be noted that the total for 2017 itself included money raised from the Sponsored Ringing Week of £2,257, which is a quadrennial event, and hence the real underlying trend is an increase of some £190. (*Author's note: It is pleasing that in 2016, at £2.85 per member, South Oxon was the fourth highest contributing branch per capita to this figure.*)

Grants

During the year five new applications for grants were received and the following provisional grants allocated: Blewbury, £1,250; Burford, £4,325; Loughton, £14,000; Stanton St John, £5,250 and Tilehurst, £10,000. Six grants totalling £31,105 were paid during the year towards eligible work at Blewbury, £1,180; Brightwell cum Sotwell, £6,200; Drayton St Leonard, £11,000; Old Marston, £4,230; Radley, £6,725 and Stratfield Mortimer, £1,770. During the year the Managing Trustees maintained the level of provisional grant allocations at 20% of the estimated costs of eligible work. The level of grant allocated depends upon the number of applications and the income available for distribution and may vary from year to year.

Investments

Investment income during the year was £22,482, a slight decrease on the 2015 figure of £23,144, reflecting the overall economic situation with continuing low interest rates. New money raised is invested on a regular basis in accordance with advice received from the Diocesan Financial Adviser.

The market value of the investments as at 31st December 2016 was £574,012, an increase of £47,921 on 2015.

General Committee Meeting

Correspondence

The Bishop of Dorchester had written to thank all members of the Guild for their ringing, and the Association of Ringing Teachers had written to thank the Guild for its donation in 2016. The Guild had again been invited to enter a band in the Tewkesbury Shield Striking Competition.

Reports from and election of Sub-Committees

a) Education reported that whilst it had yet to persuade/elect a new Chairman it was grateful to Patricia Newton for acting in this capacity.

Another Ten-Bell Course, this time focusing on Grandsire Caters, was being planned at Aston Clinton for later in the year, one focusing on Cambridge and Yorkshire S. Royal having already been held there on 4th February.

The 2017/18 Young Ringers Ward Scheme starts on 1st April 2017. In addition, and unrelated to the Scheme, the sub-committee is keen to encourage dedicated practices for young ringers, being delighted by those already being arranged on a regular basis. The usual courses - Radley (8th April), Michaelmas (30th September) and Steeple Aston (28th October) are in the course of planning.

In the past the sub-committee has been in the happy position of having our Guild Educational Booklets printed at low cost, and would be very interested to hear from any Guild Member who currently has access to low or zero-cost printing or photocopying facilities.

There are concerns that when notices are distributed electronically, particularly those advertising courses, they do not always find their way on to tower notice boards.

Tower Captains are asked please to display them and encourage potential students to apply.

b) Towers and Belfries reported that the committee is working towards developing a course to help tower captains/steeple keepers to improve their bells as opposed to just maintain them, covering topics such as correcting odd-struckness.

The Tower Maintenance Award Scheme has declined slightly with the number of current awards having fallen by 2 to 17.

c) Finance and General Purposes reported on revision work on the Terms of Reference of the sub-committees and Guild Officers, this work being undertaken to reflect current practice or to expand areas of activity for greater efficiency.

The committee received views and discussed the difficulty some branches have in stewarding both the Eight-Bell Striking Competition and the Ringing Day on the same day. The decision was taken to retain both events on the same day (May Day Bank Holiday Monday) but to hold them in different but adjacent branches. The Guild's 15-Year Plan (which pre-plans which events are to be held in which branches) is to be revised accordingly.

The sub-committee was asked to consider whether new members could be elected at branch practices and whether any rule changes are needed for this to be possible. The rules currently state that new members can be elected at a General Meeting of the Branch or Guild, and it was felt that a branch practice, provided it was open to all members, could also be a General Meeting of the Branch provided that adequate notice was given to all towers, including the business to be transacted, and that no rule changes are required. An advisory sheet will be sent to all branches covering this subject.

Reports from:

a) Peal Secretary. A full copy of this report appears in the recently published Guild Annual Report for 2016.

b) Public Relations Officer. Bobbie May has continued to provide reports of Guild events to the Ringing World, and reported on the Guild's involvement with the BBC *Countryfile* extravaganza held in the grounds of Blenheim palace in August 2016 at which the Lichfield Diocesan Mobile Belfry was present.

c) Safeguarding Officer. Katie Lane presented her report. Whilst this subject continues to attract some (not altogether positive) attention it is worth repeating verbatim the penultimate paragraph of her report:

“Safeguarding children is not a difficult or daunting task. Thoughtful and sensible working practices are not restrictive; their aim is to keep children and vulnerable adults safe, and to make sure that, in the unlikely circumstances of a retrospective allegation, we have systems and evidence in place to support our members.”

I should report that Katie had recently held a meeting with the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser, and as a result there will be a need to extend the policy and procedures previously circulated. The Guild's procedures are to be considered by the F&GP Committee and put before the Guild General Committee in November before final approval, but in order to provide towers with a “heads up” before then, and to allow

towers to think about their own appointments in advance, the Safeguarding Adviser's requirements are now that:

- Each tower with young ringers will be required to appoint a Children's Officer who must not be the same person as the Tower Captain or the person teaching children or vulnerable adults. (*STOP PRESS – At the Guild AGM on 20th May Katie reported that this requirement has now, for the time being, been relaxed, but the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer continues to deliberate on this subject*).
- There must be one man and one woman, both of whom must be DBS-checked, whenever children and/or vulnerable adults are present.

I must stress that at this stage these requirements and their finer details are subject to final approval by Guild General Committee.

d) Librarian. There were 12 enquiries and loan requests during 2016, two fewer than in 2015, continuing the slight downward trend since 2013. Approximately 40 different items of library material were acquired in 2016, and work is continuing on the trial electronic archive.

e) Webmaster. A proposal was put to refresh the Gild Web Site. As this document runs to 2½ pages I have not attempted to summarise it here, but will gladly provide a copy to anyone who so wishes. A proposal that the F&GP appoint a working group to scope, develop and launch a refreshed web site with a maximum expenditure of £1,000 and an on-going maintenance budget not exceeding £400 in the first year saw the maximum expenditure figure increased to £2,000 and was then passed.

Posts specified in Rule 9(c) & (f) (iii): Notification of officers not willing to stand for re-election. Those not seeking re-election at the Guild AGM in May are the current Deputy Master, one Steward, the Public Relations Officer and the Webmaster. The Guild Master, Hilarie Rogers, would be happy to stand down as Master this year if somebody comes forward for the post. Similarly the Safeguarding Officer would be pleased to work alongside someone for the forthcoming year with a view to standing down in 2018.

Accounts for the year ended 31st December 2016

These showed an excess of income over expenditure of £1,396.76, broadly similar to 2015 (£1,033.81). The balance of the General Fund (day-to-day income and expenditure) therefore stood at £16,864.90. Probably the only notable variances in any of the classifications of income and expenditure were slightly higher expenditure on Ringing Events (£961.32 compared to £659.90 in 2015, due in the main to expenditure on Ringing World National Youth Contest travel subsidies of £165; Ringing Award Scheme Prizes of £75 and the Guild Festival, £150); a lower expenditure on the Guild Library in 2016 (£205.84 compared to £555.35 in 2015) and a lower claim by Guild Officers for their expenses (£269.06 compared to £464.38 in 2015).

Management of the Restoration Fund (Registered Charity No. 284053)

Income was similar to 2015 at £2,104.59 (£2,221.44 in 2015) and grants paid likewise at £5,185 (£5,982 in 2015) resulting an excess of payments over receipts of £3,080.41. Grants were paid to Horspath £185 (replacing pulleys) and Drayton St Leonard, £5,000 (new bell). The Restoration Fund is also holding money in restricted funds for two future projects planned for Longworth (£10,700.96) and Taynton (£8,225.00).

Donations to the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund, Oxford Diocesan Guild of Church Bell Ringers' Restoration Fund and the Ringing World

The meeting recommended donations of £750 to each of the two funds and £250 to the Ringing World, subject to ratification at the Guild AGM in May.

Terms of Reference of the sub-committees

These had been revised by the Finance and General Purposes Committee and included making the Terms of Reference more consistent across the committees and reviewing memberships and quorums. Delegated expenditure is now authorised where appropriate. The Terms of Reference will be reviewed in two years.

Guild Festival

Branches had been asked to provide their feedback on the future of the Guild Festival following the disappointing attendance at the Festival in 2015. Having collated these further thought will be given to the future of the Festival.

Any other business

Guidance was sought by one member as to the protocol to be followed in the event of the death of the Monarch or a senior member of the Royal Family. The Master had sought the advice of Bishop Colin who stated that advice will be sent to ringers at the time although this will be suggestive only and it will be up to individual incumbents as to how their bells are actually rung.

Guild General Committee Meeting; Sat. 25th November 2017, held at Great Brickhill, Bucks.

Correspondence

The Guild's Report Editor, Heather Browning, had requested that all material for the Guild Report for 2017 be submitted to her by the end of January 2018.

Reports of Sub-committees

- a) Finance & General Purposes reported that at their June meeting they reviewed how to manage the Guild without a Secretary. Having given this considerable thought the Master had arranged that various tasks were allocated to the branch secretaries and this was working well. Ken Darvill from Beaconsfield had also offered to deal with e mails and some other jobs until the end of the year.

Tim Hayward was appointed Webmaster at the September meeting and will take on the role when the new web site has been developed.

Elva Ainsworth, Public Relations Officer (PRO), updated both meetings on her ideas. Nine out of the fifteen branches responded to her e mail that had asked what their particular needs were and she is working through the best ways to provide support.

The September meeting endorsed the proposal to hold a training day on 'How to Present Ringing', currently being planned for 21st April 2018.

Slightly less positive was the review of the Guild Festival following the feedback from the March General Committee Meeting. The festival would be discussed by the F&GP closer to the date of the next scheduled event in 2021, perhaps considering whether the frequency should be extended to mark significant anniversaries only.

Striking Competition methods for 2018 had been agreed as Double Norwich for the 8-Bell and Plain Bob Royal for the 10-Bell.

- (b) Education reported that the Radley, Michaelmas and Steeple Aston courses had taken place as usual and applications for the latter two courses had shown a sharp increase.

Those who currently organize the helpers for Radley and Michaelmas courses and the towers for the Radley and Steeple Aston courses wish to relinquish their roles and new volunteers are sought for these essential tasks.

A Leadership Workshop for branch delegates and the Guild Stewards is to be held at Amersham on 3rd February.

The 2018 Radley Course will be the 25th such course and in seeking to make the day special the sub-committee would be interested to hear from Guild members who were tutors, students or helpers on the early courses, especially the inaugural one in 1994.

- (c) Towers and Belfries reported that nine inspections had been carried out since the last report, the majority in connection with the Tower Maintenance Award Scheme (TMA).

One rope splicing course, one maintenance course and one combined course had been run.

Interest in the TMA had improved slightly with the number of current awards having risen to 20. The number of towers participating or expressing an interest in the scheme is 90, being about 24% of the towers in the Diocese.

Two key members of this committee will shortly be standing down and whilst it is important that they be replaced, Guild members are asked that the name of any potential candidate is provided to the Committee *before* the candidate is approached in order to ensure that anyone proposed possesses the appropriate technical expertise.

Central Council Representatives' Report

Our Guild has six CC Representatives, all of whom contribute to the Council's work by serving on working committees and representing the Guild at the Central Council's

AGM. Those for the 2017-2020 triennium are Ken Davenport, John Harrison, Lucy Hopkins Till, Graham John, Alan Marchbank and Tim Pett.

The need for reform had been under discussion for some time and at the 2016 AGM a Council Review Action Group (CRAG) was set up to prepare a report and motions to be presented at the 2017 AGM, and all seven substantive motions were carried.

Ringling World finances still depend heavily on donations, with 70% of quarter peals being accompanied by a donation but only 25% of peals, which take more space.

Next year's meeting at Lancaster will be in a new format, more like a conference, with most of the sessions being open to ringers who are not Council members.

Diary of events

South Oxon Branch members may be interested to know that it is the branch's turn to host the Guild Spring General Committee Meeting and Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund AGM, held on the second Saturday in March, and it is currently planned that this will be at Little Milton on the afternoon of 10th March 2018.

Guild Budget for 2018

This currently projects a deficit in 2018 of £2,395. The various items of income and expenditure are all projected to be broadly in line with recent years which have usually seen a surplus of something exceeding £1,000. The exception in 2018 relates to the costs of developing the new web site which means that web site expenditure is anticipated to be in the order of £3,000 in contrast to the more usual annual expenditure of £300.

Subscriptions for 2018

With the Guild having healthy reserves that would be more than able to absorb the anticipated deficit the Guild's General Treasurer, Stuart Gibson, was happy to propose that subscriptions for Resident Ringing Members, Associate Members and Non-resident Ringing Members remain at £8 per head and this was agreed by the meeting.

Peal Fees for 2018

These will remain at 50p per participant.

Management of the Restoration Fund (Registered Charity No. 284053)

Total funds raised so far in 2017 are slightly down at £1,917 but remain comparable to the same period last year (£2,055).

There has been only one grant request in 2017 and the Trustees were able to make a provisional offer to Chinnor of £185 for the replacement of gudgeons. One other provisional grant remains outstanding until the proposed work is completed, to Longworth of £1,300 towards the augmentation to 6 bells.

In addition to its General Fund showing a balance of £11,137 the Restoration Fund also holds restricted funds that have been raised in connection with the proposed projects at Longworth (£14,429) and Taynton (£24,495).

New Website

The meeting enjoyed a visual presentation given by Elva Ainsworth and Tim Hayward. Among the proposals is a new map of towers and the branches, developed using Google maps and linked-in to the Dove website. It is also possible that three separate grades of log-in will be made available; one each for the public, Guild members and Guild Officers.

Any other business

Robert Newton made reference to proposals that were currently being aired to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War on Sunday 11th November 2018, namely that following the traditional half-muffled ringing in the morning, muffles be removed to provide open ringing later in the day, and also that a campaign might be launched to recruit 1,400 new ringers, being the number of ringers who lost their lives in the war. Robert expressed his reservations about the practicalities of removing muffles half-way through the day and that recruiting new ringers in connection with those who had lost their lives in war might be seen as inappropriate. He asked that views on the ideas be communicated to him in order that he could pass these on to the Central Council.

The Guild's Safeguarding Officer, Katie Lane, reported on a recent meeting she had attended with the Oxford Diocesan Safeguarding Committee. Katie had met with the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser earlier in the year when the Adviser had stipulated that in future 1) each tower with young ringers will be required to appoint a Children's Officer who must not be the same person as the Tower Captain or the person teaching children or vulnerable adults, and 2) there must be one man and one woman present, both of whom must be DBS-checked, whenever children and/or vulnerable adults are in the tower.

Many had expressed their reservations about these requirements, not least that in the vast majority of cases they would not be practical. Katie therefore offered a different solution, namely that her name and contact details together with those of the local Parish's Safeguarding Officer be displayed in every tower in the Diocese. Nevertheless the Committee has asked her to find out how many towers in the Diocese *could* appoint their own Children's Officer before they consider the matter further.

Branch Striking Competition 2017

I was exhorted by our former Branch Secretary to produce a report for this for *Look To* earlier in the year but I regret that I didn't have the capacity at the time to do so. Nevertheless I hope that this report will serve for the record and perhaps encourage a few more entries for 2018.

The competition was held on Saturday 22nd April at Shabbington, a light and easy-going six but presenting a slight challenge in being anti-clockwise, something that is becoming rarer as the years go by as rings are re-hung in new frames.

Three bands entered this year and with two of the regular towers not able to present a team we might otherwise have had a record turn-out. I believe that the wedding of a certain Branch Newsletter Editor may have had something to do with one tower's absence!

The competition was judged by a long-standing ringing friend of the author, Barry Eglesfield, who rang in the author's first peal almost exactly 42 years previously. Barry is well known in ringing circles in North Bucks and the surrounding area.

All the bands successfully completed their test-pieces and a resume of Barry's comments together with the faults marked for each team in the order in which they were drawn to ring is as follows:-

<p>Little Milton Rang Plain Hunt on 5. Seemed to struggle a little in getting used to the bells but their ringing eventually settled. They had a nice rhythm in their opening rounds. Their backstroke leads were slow at times.</p>	29	3
<p>Ringing Master's Invitation Band Rang Called Changes. This band also had a nice rhythm in their opening rounds and they settled into their changes quite quickly. There was a problem in the middle of their piece with one change but otherwise their ringing was quite good.</p>	19	2
<p>Drayton St Leonard Rang Grandsire Doubles. This test-piece was rung very well and the judge had to listen quite attentively to pick up their faults.</p>	4	1

The Shabbington ringers had provided refreshments which were gratefully received and enjoyed by all. We extend our thanks to them and to Barry for coming to judge.

As always it is not so much the winning of Striking Competitions but the taking part that counts, and the focus of practising before taking part in a competition is always effort well spent when it helps to improve striking overall. There are very few bands that have been able to win the first competition they ever enter, and quite a few that have had to start by coming last and gradually work their way up the rankings. Will we see a few more have a try in 2018?

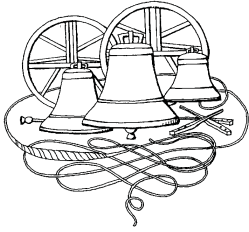
